



Community Characterization Survey Questions (Examples)

1. How large is your community/company/organization/institution/agency? What has been the recent growth profile?
2. How diverse is your community/company/organization/institution/agency...
 - a. Economically?
 - b. Demographically (e.g. age distribution)?
3. What are the prominent geographic features of your community/etc.?
4. What are the most important/influential institutions, organizations, or businesses in your community?
5. What are the “hot-button” social/political/leadership issues? Have these changed substantially over the past 5-10 years?
6. What is the land use profile in your community (%commercial/industrial/residential/municipal)?

Community Hazards and Planning Information

7. What local/regional/global management challenges are you currently dealing with (storm water - surface runoff, supply chain, development or redevelopment, transportation, coastal access, public health - do not include hazard threat and impact information)?
8. What hazards have impacted you in the past?
9. What hazards have you experienced recently or are you concerned about experiencing soon?
10. Have you seen any changes in the weather or how often events are occurring?



11. What information for your community/company/organization/agency is available already that describes these hazards, their impacts; what has happened and what is projected to happen?

12. Are there existing plans where you can review this information?

13. Are there people you can talk to about the hazard and climate change threats and impacts? (i.e. advisory panel, experts, hazard mitigation planners, private sector).
